



Water Stewardship News

Stewardship of fresh water and watersheds continues to be a focus of NALT's and a growing community of water stewards.

Water Quality Monitoring

With the Regional District of Nanaimo's Drinking Water and Watershed Protection program (DWWP) NALT participates in annual monitoring on a number of rivers and creeks. Directly, NALT staff and volunteers monitor two sites on the Nanaimo River and also on Holden Creek. For five Tuesdays in the late summer and five Tuesdays in the fall, NALT gathers data during the period of summer low-flow and fall-flush, capturing information about water quality during the expected extremes of regular river conditions. This activity is repeated throughout the RDN by a number of watershed stewardship groups.

NALT supports local streamkeepers participating in the monitoring program in a few different ways. Groups that lack a formal structure, which includes volunteer insurance coverage required by the RDN to participate, can either become a committee of NALT or less formal groups can sign on as NALT volunteers. Either way, NALT's coverage is extended to cover volunteer activities. Streamkeepers Workshop

Once again, NALT presented a Streamkeepers Workshop to train community water stewards in the elements and indicators of stream health. On November 2 – 3, eleven folks came together at the Pacific Gardens Cohousing Community to learn about the tenets of the Streamkeeper program under the enthusiastic tutelage of well-known fish biologist Dave Clough. The group enjoyed Dave's energetic classroom discussion and the creekside (and instream) field lessons on the Cat Stream and Chase River. They even identified coho smolt in the Cat Stream!

On completion of the workshop participants receive a Streamkeepers certificate and are ready to wade deeper into stream stewardship. Through various fundraising activities, NALT is able to offer this workshop free of charge other than a nominal fee to cover the cost of workbooks. Typically, NALT presents two Streamkeeper Workshops per year, one in the spring, the other in the fall. Also, NALT has recently acquired a Streamkeeper kit to lend out to community stream stewards. Watershed Restoration

On November 9th, a large group of volunteers joined the Walley Creek Streamkeepers to install native plants along a stretch of Walley Creek riparian area. Many hands make light work. Because of the tremendous turn-out, 35 volunteers were able to move 15 yards of topsoil to areas outlined by fallen tree trunks, 7 yards of mulch and plant 260 native plants including 100 trees in the four hours.

On November 16th, more than 30 people gathered at the Pacific Gardens Cohousing Community for a wetland workshop and restoration activity. Billed as *a walk*, *a talk*, *a workshop*, participants enjoyed a walk from an onsite wetland to the nearby Chase River. Afterwards, everyone gathered inside for a presentation and discussion with Capri Brugge and Sara Gourlay from the RDN DWWP Team Watersmart. Following the presentation all enjoyed a homemade lunch provided by Pacific Gardens and then participated in a wetland riparian area restoration project under the design and direction of Lindsey Haist from Alder Environmental Services. The plants used in the restoration were sourced at NALT's *Natural Abundance Native Plant Nursery*.

Water Stewardship in a Changing Climate

The <u>Vancouver Island Symposia Series</u> highlights the power of collaboration between local governments, elected leaders and local stewardship and conservation groups. This collaboration is essential to mobilize and respond effectively to the impacts of climate change and to reconnect the built and natural environments that surround us. The series is a building blocks process. Each event builds on the last and points the way to the next. The symposium format provides a neutral forum to 'convene for action' to improve where we live. The series is guided by this two-track philosophy: **provide a boost to the local co-hosts while advancing inter-regional outcomes**. The first symposium, held in Nanaimo in April 2018, elevated the profile of the Nanaimo & Area Land Trust (NALT) and led directly to formation of the Nanaimo Watershed Health Community of Practice.

Who's in a Name?

"As an outcome flowing from the Nanaimo 2018 Symposium, we set out to do the hard work to become another collaboration success story," states Paul Chapman, NALT Executive Director. "The time was right – a civic election was on the horizon (in October 2018), and the energy of the symposium was sparking ideas. We gathered as a group of like-minded and began to plan."

"The initial impetus came from the Departure Creek, Walley Creek and Millstone River Streamkeepers, the Nanaimo & Area Land Trust (NALT) and the Five-Acre Farm. In the absence of an advisory committee on the environment, promotion of the work of stewardship sector was of the high importance."

A Short History

"The initiative began with an information campaign and questions posed to all prospective candidates for Nanaimo City Council during the 2018 civic elections," continues Paul Chapman. "After the election, follow-up information was shared with the with the successful candidates for Mayor and council. Whenever a riparian setback variance was requested for a property, NALT would appear before council to speak to the importance of healthy functioning watersheds."

Creekshed Walkabout with Nanaimo City Council

On October 25th, Mayor Leonard Krog and Councillors Don Bonner and Ben Geselbracht, as well as City of Nanaimo staff members, joined the NWHCoP on a tour of local creeksheds. NALT organized the day and threaded the visits together.

The Tour began on a farm along the Millstone River with a presentation by Jen Cody (Foodshare Nanaimo) and Craig Evans (Growing Opportunities) on food system resilience and environmental farm plans.

Next the tour visited a site on the Millstone downstream of Brannen Lake, where Bernie Heinrichs and the Island Water Fly Fishers have undertaken an innovative bank stabilization project.

From these rural settings the tour moved to urban streams. On Walley Creek folks learned of the work of stewards and the challenges faced due to dewatering for an upstream construction project and the extreme flows in the creek during storm events.

The tour concluded at Departure Creek where the Streamkeepers outlined the history of stewardship on the creek and some of the recent successes. Through a few setbacks, more triumphs, community partnerships and a considerable amount of dedication and hard work Departure Creek is becoming an urban stream stewardship success story.

Making Connections; Building Relationships

"At the Nanaimo 2018
Symposium, I was inspired by
ZoAnn Morten's co-keynote
presentation," recalls Paul
Chapman. ZoAnn is the
Executive Director of the
Pacific Streamkeepers
Federation. She spoke about
the buy-in of West Vancouver
District Council to the point
where Council members had
taken the Streamkeepers
workshop and were part of the
promotion of stewardship of
local creeksheds.

The Nanaimo Watershed Health Community of Practice has set out to build relationships with City Council

and staff in a collegial and collaborative way. "With our efforts to date, the process has begun. The connections have been made — between stewards, decision-makers and staff; and with the creeks themselves. The relationships will grow as we build a culture of stewardship."

Now What?

"Watersheds and aquifers don't align with regional district boundaries; to achieve effective water stewardship we need to work across political boundaries and jurisdictions. It will take a broad-based effort to sustain restorative policies and actions." states Paul Chapman.

"Over the last number of years NALT has been part of a growing community of water conservation. With the participation of numerous community stewardship groups, the City of Nanaimo and the Regional District of Nanaimo, NALT has seen concerns, understanding and actions related to restoring watersheds and water balance become a priority in our region."

"Through the lessons learned and interaction at the various water symposiums, we have expanded the tools of restoration and expert contacts available to enhance our stewardship efforts."

"The saying from the hiking community is: *If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together.* The challenges of urban and rural expansion, multiplied by the instability of climate change mean we are in this for the long-haul and we are all in this together. A community of conservation is the surest way to sustain the effort needed."

Nursery News

The sun-kissed fall found nursery volunteers enjoying lunch outdoors most weeks. During the week of the annual "burn and roast," the NALT JCP trails team of Shelley, James, Linley, and Frankie, along with Carra Simpson, joined the Nursery crew for sausages and marshmallows roasted on pitchforks.

Mid November's deep rain produced good digging conditions in the rich, loamy soil. A tree purchaser from Gabriola took advantage and dug 8 large Douglas firs in one morning, then returned on the ferry to plant the trees in their new home.

Pacific Gardens Co-operative Housing, along with RDN, NALT, and Alder Environmental, hosted an educational day of learning about stream bank restoration. Sixty-two shrubs and trees plus stinging nettle and mint seeds came from the nursery. What a great example of a cooperative effort for a good cause! Another program the nursery was glad to be involved with is the VUI Education Department's Indigenous learning program. To celebrate the final class in their program, Elders and student gifted each other with native plants; sacred trees to the Elders, herbaceous perennials to the students.

Last December the nursery provided the City with a large tree for Frank Crane ice arena. The tree was part of the City's display for skaters' enjoyment. This year, during the week between Christmas and New Years, we are glad to provide a lovely Juniper tree. Come check it out – no skates required!

Throughout the year, NALT nursery volunteers are happy to assist in community programs. We designate \$300 annually to provide support, sometimes in the form of donated gift certificates for community fundraising events. This year we provided 6 such gift certificates.

Volunteers have been digging and potting trees for the annual NALT nursery Christmas tree sale. The trees will be ready for sale at the NALT office and at the nursery beginning December 12th. We offer the buy or rent option, and we're glad to share info on how to best care for your living tree. The nursery will also sell tabletop Christmas trees, seeds, and camas bulbs at the Port Place Mall NALT Display— another tradition we are happy to include on our schedule.

Thank you for your support. The NALT Native plant Nursery could not exist without our community's involvement! Whether shopping for plants, a donation of plant pots, or a few hours volunteering all is appreciated. What else could we use? The nursery is in need of more volunteers. There is an abundance of work year round, and in January we move into hard wood propagation season. Volunteer opportunities at the nursery are on Wednesdays and Saturdays when we always have big muscle and small muscle tasks. For people who want to help with our seeds, there is work to do at home preparing and packaging seeds for sale. We would love to grow our volunteer base! Also, the nursery is in particular need of another seed display rack, in case you have one tucked away in storage you're no longer using.
