#### Building a Culture of Stewardship

What does it mean to build a culture of stewardship? It means working to move the behavior of our community to return to balance with ecology. This means finding ways to live and work that not only don't harm the connections that make for a healthy ecosystem but finding ways to actively support these connections. It also means forging connections between people to achieve a return to balance.

NALT works with stewardship groups and champions to do this. On Beck Creek, Cat Stream, Departure Creek, Walley Creek, the Nanaimo River and many of the waterways that make up our home landscape, we work with water stewards to restore the health of these waterways. We have an active project seeking to connect schools and school communities to their watersheds. Our Natural Abundance Native Plant Nursery provides plants for restoration projects and restoring our yards to support nature. Through the promotion of native plants in gardening and landscaping we work to connect the parks and protected areas of our community by building corridors of connections for endemic pollinators like bees, butterflies and hummingbirds (Pollinator Paradise project coming soon, stay tuned for details).

NALT works with local and provincial level organizations to share and support stories of stewardship through the Nanaimo River Watershed Roundtable, the Mid-Island Stewardship Caucus, support of stewardship groups and initiatives and the Watershed Moments symposia series. You may have seen the 2020 symposium online or on Shaw TV. The 2021 symposium promises to add perspectives to the conversation toward making lasting change.

NALT has been blessed with a strong and growing membership and a cohort of active volunteers. We've done a lot together, there is still much to do. There is a saying in backpacking that is apt for the journey of building a culture of stewardship – If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together. We want to go far together.

#### Workshops Are Us

The COVID enforced pent-up demand for connection and action has lead to NALT offering a bevy of workshops and presentations this late winter and early spring.

- On March 6<sup>th</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> NALT hosted a Streamkeeper workshop presented by David Clough about the indicators of creek health for stream stewards. Once again Dave shared his wealth of knowledge, experience and humour to train up a new cohort of Streamkeepers.
- On March 20<sup>th</sup> 21<sup>st</sup>, NALT is hosting a fully-subscribed bioengineering workshop presented by renown expert in the field David Polster. The weekend course consists of lessons delivered online and hands on participation doing restoration work on the Millstone River.
- March 31<sup>st</sup>, NALT will host an online evening presentation on identifying and monitoring western painted turtles in our local lakes (see page 6).
- April 10<sup>th</sup> 11<sup>th</sup> NALT will host a fully-subscribed Wetland Keepers workshop on the mapping and monitoring of wetlands for the stewardship sector.

All of our workshops and presentations will be carried out with health and safety as a top priority. In some cases, the number of participants is limited to ensure safe physical distancing can be maintained.

Thanks to Alison encouraging non-members who wished to take part in her art lessons to sign up for a NALT membership, we have over 70 new members in our stewardship community.



#### NALT's School Water Stewards Project

The School Water Stewards project is getting students out of the classroom and into their boots, muddybuddies and rainpants to explore their local watershed!

No matter the weather we have been out with students at their neighbourhood creeks, marshes and puddles to measure, observe, and explore where their water comes from, where it goes, and how it connects with plants, animals and the landscape along the way. Students have been evaluating the impacts we have on our watersheds, and learning ways to assess if their local creeks and wetlands are healthy or sick. Our goal is to teach students the many ways they can actively steward their watersheds.

Activities and lessons include Jr. Streamkeepers lessons, habitat enhancement through building and monitoring nest boxes for songbirds and waterfowl, invasive plant mapping and removal, riparian planting and native plant propagation, amphibian monitoring, water quality and hydrology lessons, storm drain marking, plant identification and sketching, and soundscape ecology lessons.

NALT is currently piloting this project with Coal Tyee and Nisaika Kumtuks elementary schools. Our hope is to offer this as a program across school district 68 & 69 (and beyond!).







This program is funded by the Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia.

#### **Nursery News**


Winter found the nursery busy digging and selling potted Christmas trees, a successful sale and rental project once again. Due to COVID, this year we were not able to sell seeds at the mall. Now it's early spring and the seed stock has returned to the nursery. We have over 50 varieties of local native seeds, all harvested, cleaned, and packaged by nursery volunteers. You can check out the list of seeds on our inventory at <a href="nat.bc.ca">nat.bc.ca</a>, or come to the nursery for a look.

In winter months we propagate seeds and cuttings and dig "volunteer" native plants. The greenhouse is full of growing babies that will soon be put out on sales tables for spring planting. Our hours remain 10 am - 3 pm on Wednesdays and 11 am - 3 pm on Saturdays.

NALT, including the nursery, adheres to public health COVID guidelines. The nursery updates our COVID protocol as needed to keep volunteers and customers safe. It may mean waiting a bit in the memorial garden across the driveway until there is plenty of space to shop safely. Guidelines are posted near the parking area, at the head of the path to the nursery.

The nursery loves interesting projects and community opportunities. One of our nursery volunteers is a recent graduate of the VIU Horticulture program. She is involved in an Arbutus project that considers types of growing media and containers. The nursery greenhouse has housed her project

over the winter months, and volunteers and customers have enjoyed watching the tiny Arbutus flourish. See the photo of some of the wee Arbutus.

Each year the nursery committee allots resources for six in-kind donations of plants and seeds for community projects. So far this year, we have assisted the Wellington Action Committee and the Wellington Secondary School student Food Forest.

We also are happy to be involved in assisting and selling plants for other community projects. Featured are pictures of two recent activities. The Green Faith Circle global climate action activity met at Maffeo Sutton on March 11<sup>th</sup>. A coalition of local churches worked

together to purchase 72 trees to be planted around the city. Every tree helps preserve clean air and add beauty, and will leave a legacy. Thank you!

#### Western Painted Turtle in the Nanaimo Area Free Public Presentation: March 31 @ 7:00pm

Join us on March 31<sup>st</sup> at 7pm for an online presentation by Connie Miller Retzer on the Western Painted Turtle population in the Nanaimo Area.

The Western Painted Turtle's Pacific Coast population was designated in 2006 as Endangered by the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) and is on Schedule 1 of the Species at Risk Act (SARA). In British Columbia it is ranked S2 (imperiled) by the Conservation Data Centre and is on the provincial Red list.

Connie Miller Retzer currently works with the Ecosystems Section, Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development. She is a graduate of the University of Toronto (BSc) and the University of Victoria (MSc). Since 1995, she has focused on the conservation of habitat for species and ecosystems at risk, including from 2017 the Western Painted Turtle project. This talk will summarize work that has been done to enhance our knowledge of Western Painted Turtles in the mid-Vancouver Island region since 2017.

The concluding segment of this presentation will outline how interested citizens can get involved in this important conservation work through the NALT Western Painted Turtle Monitoring Project.

#### Mid-Island Stewardship Caucus

NALT seeks ways to make connections with rights holders, stakeholders and stewardship groups. Sometimes these connections are short-lived (the equivalent of an exchange of business cards), project based (a mutual assist to achieve an outcome like a stream restoration project) and sometimes these are longer exchanges of information and resources that build lasting relationships (such as our participation on producing an annual water stewardship symposium).

We have recently been part of a new initiative to forge connections. Meeting as the Mid-Island Stewardship Caucus, NALT has attended two online meetings with stewardship groups focussed on the area from French Creek to Qualicum Bay and inland.

So far the meetings have seen approximately a dozen folks representing 7 – 8 groups sharing information about the history of stewardship en-

gagement and current initiatives in their areas of concern.

Under the umbrella of the Mount Arrowsmith Biosphere Reserve Research Institute (MABRRI) we will soon be sharing these stories with a wider audience through a regional newsletter. Where will this all lead? It is hard to know but it is certain that improved communication and personal connection are important building blocks to support, promote and protect the natural values of land and water on a regional scale.

#### French Creek News

(Editor's note: In November of 2020, the NALT Board sent a letter supporting the efforts of a coalition of organizations seeking to secure a significant area of the French Creek estuary for conservation)

#### Where Eagles Soar

Creating the First Bald Eagle Preserve on Vancouver Island at the French Creek Estuary

David Hancock, of the Hancock Wildlife Foundation: "This is a significant and important area for nesting, resident and wintering Bald Eagles and should be an Eagle Preserve."

This 23 acre private property is located on the unceded territory of the Qualicum and Snaw-Naw-As First Nations in the Regional District of Nanaimo adjacent to the northwest side of the French Creek estuary. Its rich ecosystem includes Coastal Douglas fir forest, a salmon and trout bearing creek, wetlands and riparian areas and is home and haven for hundreds of species of wildlife including 19 Species at Risk.



The Friends of French Creek Conservation Society has worked for 16 years to conserve this ecologically vital area and has partnered with the Save Estuary Land Society on the Eagle Preserve. A unique aspect of this project is the collaboration of property owner, French Creek House Ltd., who will generously gift over 12 acres for the Eagle Preserve and wish to sell the remaining five acres to complete the preserve.



#### **Five Acre Land Acquisition**

The Eagle Preserve Partnership is fundraising \$500,000 toward the purchase of the five acres to complete the Eagle Preserve. ## RESTORING Nature Naturally Bioengineering Workshop with David Polster

#### March 20th - 21st

Soil bioengineering is an applied science that uses live plant materials to perform an engineering function such as slope stabilization, soil erosion control, or seepage control. This two-day course will focus on soil bioengineering techniques and options involved in restoration and reclamation of damaged ecosystems using a combination of structural materials, vegetative cuttings and other specialized methods.

The focus for the course is to learn and refine skills in the field of **Ecological Restoration**. By renewing and restoring degraded, damaged, or destroyed ecosystems and habitats in the environment we will work as a group to learn the skills and transfer them into key techniques out in the field.

David Polster is a plant ecologist with over 35 years of experience in vegetation studies and reclamation. He has developed a wide variety of reclamation techniques for the re-establishment of riparian and aquatic habitats.

The first day will be a few hours long spent on Zoom setting the context. The second day we will travel to field sites and take part in learning some key bioengineering techniques to enhance the success of restoration projects.

For the field day participants will need to bring work clothes, gloves, work boots, possibly rain gear, and secateurs (garden shears, if you have them). Eye protection is highly recommended as there will be people walking around with branches and sharpened stakes.

### COURSE IS FULL. GET ON THE PRIORITY LIST FOR 2022

This course will teach you how to map, classify and assess the ecological integrity of our precious local wetlands. We will be trained to use a protocol specially developed by professional biologist Ryan Durand for use by volunteer stewards. Ryan has trained many volunteer stewards in the use of this protocol in other parts of BC with great success.

This course will be run in the field from 9:00am to 3:00pm on both Saturday and Sunday. Be sure to dress for the weather. Bring rubber boots AND/OR hip waders if you have them. Bring a lunch.



Ryan Durand, MSc., RPBio. is an ecologist with EcoLogic Consultants. He has spent the last 20 years working on a wide range of ecosystem classification and mapping, vegetation inventories, and rare species surveys. Over the last ten years Ryan has focused on wetland mapping, classification, and restoration. He has completed dozens of projects throughout western Canada and the arctic, including baseline programs for major projects, long term research, wetland restoration, teaching community groups and professionals' wetland mapping and classification, and writing effects assessments for Environmental Assessments.

#### **Nanaimo Area Wetland Assessment and Monitoring Program**

NALT is launching a Nanaimo Area Wetland Assessment and Monitoring Program where we assess the ecological health of local wetlands and create plans for monitoring of vulnerable species and for restoration of poorly functioning wetlands. We hope that participants in this course will be willing to assist us in collecting data on our local wetlands with the goal of collecting data on 3 to 5 wetlands a year.
